Marilyn Schaack Schaubert, 96, passed away Sunday, June 1, 2025 in Henderson, NV.

Daughter of Mathias and Theresa (Laber) Schaack, Marilyn was born Oct. 26, 1928 in Sykeston, ND where she grew up on the family farm just outside of town. After graduating from Sykeston High School, Marilyn moved to Fargo, ND and entered an associate arts degree program to become a registered nurse.

Marilyn graduated from nursing training and was awarded a nursing license (RN), then took a position at a hospital in Denver, CO.

After marrying in 1952, Marilyn and Vernon moved to California where they raised their family. Marilyn was a stay-at-home mom to four children. She is remembered fondly as an expert seamstress/birthday cake decorator/cub scout leader/class mom ... and all-around problem solver. It wasn't until her last child was in high school that she went back to work as an RN at the neighborhood hospital. In 2001, she and Vernon retired and made the move to Henderson, Nevada.

Marilyn enjoyed crafts, including needlepoint, painting, crocheting and knitting, and decorating the coolest cakes for her kids' and grandkids' birthdays. She sewed prolifically, creating everything from clothes for Barbies to special Halloween costumes to custom curtains and quilts.

For most of her adult life, Marilyn participated in league bowling and enjoyed playing cards. Mostly, she liked being around friends. Nothing beat several cups of coffee shared around the kitchen table where major and minor topics were discussed in detail. Among her causes was saving the trees at Orcutt Park (she won) and second-guessing the Catholic Church's decision to say the mass in English (she lost). In her youth, she worked out regularly with Jack LaLanne on TV. Later, she developed a decades-long loyalty to Dr. Phil and Oprah. The Los Angeles Lakers were her team.

Marilyn was preceded in death by her son, Scott; her parents; her sisters Norma Zink and Valeria Herman, and brothers Jack Schaack and Bob Schaack. She is survived by her brother Jerry Schaack of Bismark, ND; sons Mark (Michelle) Schaubert of Battle Ground, WA, and Neil Schaubert of Los Angeles, CA; and daughter Mary Schaubert of Abilene, TX; four grandchildren and five great grandchildren.

Vernon Jake Schaubert, 91, passed away Oct. 27, 2018 in Henderson, NV. The son of Jake and Eldora Schaubert, Vernon was born June 22, 1927 in rural Bowden, ND where he grew up on the family farm. After graduating from Bowden High School, he earned his bachelor's degree with a dual major in mathematics and education from North Dakota State University.

Vernon volunteered for four years of military service and was stationed in England. He reached the rank of sergeant in the Air Force with a specialty in the handling of nuclear materials.

Moving to the San Fernando Valley in California, Vernon entered the aerospace field, finding employment with Atomics International as its nuclear materials manager. He remained with the company in its various forms for his entire 40-year career, primarily at the DeSoto, Rocketdyne, and Santa Susana test facilities.

He retired to Henderson, NV in 2001 with his wife of 66 years, Marilyn Schaack Schaubert.

Vernon played the saxophone, loved country music and sang in a Dixieland quartet. Born left-handed, he became ambidextrous when his grade school would not accommodate his choice. He was a gifted artist who taught himself how to sketch using pencil as his preferred medium. An athlete, he played on his championship high school basketball team. During his working career, he remained active in sports. He bowled competitively and participated on company basketball and slow-pitch softball teams. In Henderson, he became a billiards champion of his retirement community and kept mentally active

playing bridge. He was also an avid reader of science fiction.

During his retirement, he remained involved in computer programming, electronics and education. He spent several semesters as a guest faculty member at Princeton University lecturing on his specialty of nuclear materials storage and disposal.

Growing up on a farm, he had a self-sufficient way about him. If it broke, he fixed it. If it needed to be customized, he built it. And he had a great moustache. It became his trademark.

Scott J. Schaubert, 62, passed away Nov. 17, 2023 at his home in Northridge, CA.

A lifelong resident of Los Angeles' San Fernando Valley, Scott graduated from El Camino Real High School in 1978 and then chose to enter the trades as a carpenter.

From grade school, Scott had worked with wood. By the age of seven, he was constructing specialized inlaid game boards that he peddled in the neighborhood.
